The Health and Human Services Committee, to which the following Board Bill was referred, reports that it has considered the same and recommends adoption of Board Bill No. 207.

Board Bill No. 207 Introduced by Alderwoman Cara Spencer, Alderwoman Christine Ingrassia, Alderwoman Heather Navarro, Alderwoman Lisa Middlebrook, Alderwoman Annie Rice, Alderman Jesse Todd, Alderwoman Pamela Boyd, Alderman Dan Guenther and Alderwoman Megan Green

The purpose of this board bill is to repeal Ordinance 68597, which contains most of the sections of the existing Food Code for the City (from the 2009 Edition of the National Food Code published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, Food and Drug Administration), and adopt as the new Food Code for the City the

terms of the most recent 2017 Edition of the National Food Code published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, Food and Drug Administration, with local revisions and amendments. The board bill also repeals Ordinance 71106 and adopts the social justice/equity aspects of the revised Temporary Food Service provisions as part of a comprehensive Food Code. Finally, the board bill proposes an updated fee structure to more closely cover costs of the City food control program, to go into effect July 1, 2022.

Board Bill No. 176 Introduced by Alderwoman Marlene E. Davis

An ordinance recommended by the Board of Public Service to conditionally vacate above surface, surface and subsurface rights for vehicle, equestrian and pedestrian travel in Virginia from Chouteau northwardly to a point, said point being vacated Gratiot in the City of St. Louis, Missouri, as hereinafter described, in accordance with Charter authority, and in conformity with Section 14 of Article XXI of the Charter and imposing certain conditions on such vacation.

Board Bill No. 218 Introduced by Alderman Jeffrey Boyd

An Ordinance, recommended by the Board of Public Service of the City of St. Louis (the "Board of Public Service"), establishing multiple public works and improvement projects within the City of St. Louis.

Board Bill No. 231 Introduced by Alderman Jesse Todd

An Ord. establishing a two-way stop site at the intersection of North Sarah Street and Westminster Place regulating all traffic traveling north bound and south bound on North Sarah Street at the intersection of North Sarah Street and Westminster Place; and containing an emergency clause.

The Housing, Urban Development and Zoning Committee, to which the following Board Bills were referred, reports that it has considered the same and recommends adoption of Board Bill Nos. 158, 160, 174, 186, 187, 188, 189. 191, 192 As Amended, 193 As Amended, 194, 195, 204, 206 As Amended, 213, 214 Committee Substitute, 215 Committee Substitute, 225 and 235 As Amended.

Board Bill No. 158 Introduced by Alderwoman Carol Howard, Alderwoman Beth Murphy and Alderman Shane Cohn

This Board Bill would establish the Bevo Mill Area Special Use District for an approximately 92.73 acre site in the Bevo Mill and Dutchtown Neighborhoods. The Special Use District Overlay zoning district, as permitted in the enabling Ordinance 66941, would prohibit certain uses and make others conditional uses that would otherwise be allowed in the underlying "F" Neighborhood Commercial, "G" Local Commercial & Office, "J" Industrial, and "K" Unrestricted Zoning Districts. It also provides additional regulations around lighting and signage, and height within a subarea of the district.

Board Bill No. 160 Introduced by Alderman Joseph D. Roddy, Alderwoman Cara Spencer and Alderwoman Marlene E. Davis

Designation of the Oscar Waring House as a City Landmark is the purpose of the legislation. Designating the home of Oscar Waring will celebrate the contribution of the first African-American Principal of Sumner High School. The Board Bill will ensure the historic exterior appearance of the house is maintained and that a community asset is protected from inappropriate alterations or demolition. The Board Bill includes the following sections: 1. Whereas clauses that denote the significance of Oscar Waring's contribution to the education of African-Americans in St. Louis 2. Whereas clause stating that the nomination is supported

by the Board of Public Service, Planning Commission and Preservation Board 3. Landmark Standards that govern future changes to the building's exterior appearance 4. Severability Clause 5. Attachments i. Landmark Petition submitted by the owner of the building ii. Fiscal Note Collapse

Board Bill No. 174 Introduced by Alderman Brandon Bosley and Alderman John Collins-Muhammad

This Board Bill would approve a Chapter 99 Redevelopment Plan and Blighting Study for the Penrose/ North Grand/ Kossuth/ Fair Redevelopment Area. This authorizes up to a twenty-five (25) year tax abatement for the Area.

Board Bill No. 186 Introduced by Alderwoman Marlene E. Davis

An Ordinance recommended by the Planning Commission on December 2, 2020, to change the zoning of property as indicated on the District Map, from the "C" Multiple-Family Dwelling District to the "G" Local Commercial and Office District, in City Block 2294 (3636 Page Blvd.), so as to include the described parcel of land in City Block 2294; and containing an emergency clause.

Board Bill No. 187 Introduced by Alderman Joseph D. Roddy

WHEREAS, by Ordinance No. 67350 this St. Louis Board of Aldermen (the "Board") authorized the Mayor, on behalf of the City of St. Louis (the "City"), to request the designation of a certain area of the City, as more fully described in said ordinance approved December 11, 2006 as an Enhanced Enterprise Zone ("EEZ") eligible for the tax incentives provided in Sections 135.950 through 135.973, inclusive, R.S.MO. (2016) as amended (the "Statute"); and

WHEREAS, the Statute allows, in certain circumstances and subject to certain conditions, the ad valorem taxes which would otherwise be due on subsequent real estate improvements made in EEZ areas to be abated up to 100% for a period not to exceed 25 years from the date the original EEZ area was so designated; or until December 11, 2031; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 67350 provides for up to a ten (10) year abatement of taxes on real property in the EEZ in accordance with the requirements of Section 135.963 of the Statute, as amended from time to time, subject to certain terms and conditions; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 67350 provides for the Enhanced Enterprise Zone Board (the "EEZ Board") to review plans for subsequent improvements on real property in the EEZ (the "Subsequent Improvements") and to recommend to this Board the extent to which tax abatement should be granted therefor; and

WHEREAS, Larson Capital Management, LLC. ("Developer") is greatly enhancing its property located at 100 North Broadway resulting in Subsequent Improvements; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that the Subsequent Improvements will cost approximately \$16,500,000; and will result in adding 325 more jobs; and

WHEREAS, EEZ Board has reviewed plans for Developer's Subsequent Improvements and recommends that the ad valorem taxes that would otherwise be imposed on Subsequent Improvements be abated for a period of ten (10) years based on 80% of the assessed value of the incremental improvements; and

WHEREAS, "Developer" began the Subsequent Improvements after January 11, 2007, the effective date of Ordinance No. 67350; and

WHEREAS, Section 135.963 of the Statute provides that no abatement shall be granted except upon approval of an authorizing resolution by the governing authority having jurisdiction over the Enhanced Enterprise Zone area following a public hearing held by said governing authority for the purpose of obtaining the opinions and suggestions of residents of political subdivision in the area affected and published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area to be affected by the exemption at least twenty (20) days prior to the hearing but not more than thirty (30) days prior to the hearing, stating the time, location, date and purpose of the hearing; and

WHEREAS, such public hearing was held on the 13th day of January, 2021, notice of which was given in accordance with the requirements of the Statutes as described above, and all interested parties had the opportunity to be heard at said public hearing.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the St. Louis Board of Aldermen as follows:

- The Subsequent Improvements for property at 100 North Broadway shall be fully exempt from the ad valorem taxes, which would otherwise be imposed thereon for a period of ten (10) years based on 80% of the assessed value of the incremental improvements.
- For purposes of calculating the tax liability for the Subsequent Improvements, any increase in the assessment of any improvements, from the assessment in effect for such improvements as of the year the project is substantially complete, shall be deemed attributable to the Subsequent Improvements.
- In accordance with Section 135.963.2 of the Statute, a copy of this resolution shall be forwarded to the Director of Missouri Department of Economic Development within thirty (30) days of its approval.

ST. LOUIS LIVING WAGE ORDINANCE LIVING WAGE ADJUSTMENT BULLETIN

NOTICE OF ST. LOUIS LIVING WAGE RATES

EFFECTIVE APRIL 1, 2020

In accordance with Ordinance No. 65597, the St. Louis Living Wage Ordinance ("Ordinance") and the Regulations associated therewith, the City Compliance Official for the City of St. Louis has determined that the following living wage rates are now in effect for employees of covered contracts:

- 1) Where health benefits as defined in the Ordinance are provided to the employee, the living wage rate is \$13.57 per hour (130% of the federal poverty level income guideline for a family of three); and
- 2) Where health benefits as defined in the Ordinance are <u>not</u> provided to the employee, the living wage rate is <u>\$18.05</u> per hour (130% of the federal poverty level income guideline for a family of three, plus fringe benefit rates as defined in the Ordinance).
- 3) Wages required under Chapter 6.20 of the Revised Code of the City of St. Louis: **<u>\$4.48</u>** per hour.

These rates are based upon federal poverty level income guidelines as defined in the Ordinance and these rates are effective as of **April 1, 2020**. These rates will be further adjusted periodically when the federal poverty level income guideline is adjusted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services or pursuant to Chapter 6.20 of the Revised Code of the City of St. Louis.

The Ordinance applies to employers who are covered by the Ordinance as defined in the Ordinance, where the contract or grant is entered into or renewed after the effective date of the Ordinance, which is November 3, 2002. Local Preference ORDINANCE #69431 Board Bill No. 295

Committee Substitute As Amended

An Ordinance repealing Section One, part 86.040 of Ordinance 56716, pertaining to the opening of bids, codified as Section 5.58.040 of the Revised Code of the City of St. Louis, and enacting a new provision on the same subject matter which allows a local bidder to match the lowest bid when the lowest bid is from a non-local bidder; enacting a new provision on the same subject matter; containing severability clause.

WHEREAS, local businesses which seek to enter into contracts with the City of St. Louis are at a competitive disadvantage with businesses from other areas because of the higher administrative costs of doing business in the City;

WHEREAS, the City of St. Louis desires to encourage businesses to remain in the City and to relocate to the City;

WHEREAS, by enacting a local preference law that allows a local firm to match the lowest bid when its bid is within 2% percent of the lowest bid, the City hopes to encourage and stimulate local business.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ST. LOUIS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION ONE. Section One, part 86.040, Ordinance 56716 is hereby repealed.

SECTION TWO. Enacted in lieu thereof is the following new section.

5.58.040 - Opening of bids.

A. Proposals shall be opened at the time and place fixed by the advertisement, in

the presence of such bidders as desire to be present, and shall be open to the inspection of bidders.

B. The bids shall not be materially modified or amended as to price, specification or otherwise, nor substitutions placed thereon, after opening except when the lowest bid is from a non-local bidder. When the lowest bid is from a non-local bidder, any local bidder within two percent of the lowest bid may match the lowest bid. If a local bidder matches the lowest bid, then the Supply Commissioner may select the bid from the local bidder. If more than one local bidder is within two percent of the lowest bid, then only the lowest local bidder may match the bid. In all other circumstances, modification, supplementation or amendment shall cause rejection of the bid. For purposes of this chapter, local bidder means a bidder whose principal place of business is within the City of St. Louis, has had a valid business license for at least one year, and is current in payment of local taxes.

Principal place of business shall be defined as the business's physical office, plant, or site where a majority (51%) of the full-time employees, chief officer, and managers of the business regularly work and conduct business, or where the plant or office and equipment required for the furnishing of the goods or performance of the services provided to the City, as required by the contract, are physically located in the City of St. Louis for at least one taxable year immediately prior to the date of the bid.

C. Bids may be for one or more or all the articles advertised for, but there shall be a specific bid on each article. The award may be made to the lowest bidder for any article, or to the lowest bidder for the entire requisition or any part thereof, but the Board of Standardization may reject any or all bids or any part of any bid.

SECTION THREE. Severability.

The provisions of this section are severable. If any provision of this ordinance is declared invalid, that invalidity shall not affect other provisions of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision.
