An Ordinance authorizing and directing the Mayor, on behalf of the City of St. Louis, to enter into and execute an Intergovernmental Agreement with Amendment with Madison County, Illinois; Monroe County, Illinois; St. Clair County, Illinois; St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department; Franklin County, Missouri; Jefferson County, Missouri; Jefferson County 911 Dispatch Board; St. Charles County, Missouri; and St. Louis County, Missouri regarding Regional interoperability in connecting the P-25-700/800 MHz radio systems through a digital radio microwave system linking the City of St. Louis, Missouri; St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department; Franklin County, Missouri; Jefferson County Missouri; Jefferson County 911 Dispatch Board; St. Charles County, Missouri; and St. Louis County, Missouri with Madison County, Illinois; Monroe County, Illinois; and St. Clair County, Illinois to the two regional network controllers and the Starcom-21 Network

An Ordinance pertaining to the Transit Sales Tax imposed pursuant to Section 94.660, RSMo., as adopted and approved by the voters of St. Louis City on August 2, 1994, pursuant to Ordinance 63168 creating the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund" directing the Treasurer of the City of St. Louis to deposit funds received pursuant to said sales tax into the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund - Account ONE" appropriating \$9,975,000 from the said sales tax for the period herein stated to the Bi-State Development Agency for certain purposes; providing for the payment of such funds during the period July 1, 2011 through, June 30, 2012; further providing that in no event shall the Comptroller draw warrants on the Treasurer for an amount greater than the amounts of the proceeds deposited in the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund" during the period of July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012; containing a severability clause and an emergency clause.
