Board Bill No. 14

An Ordinance pertaining to the Transit Sales Tax imposed pursuant to Section 94.660, RSMo., as adopted and approved by the voters of St. Louis City on August 2, 1994, pursuant to Ordinance 63168 creating the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund" directing the Treasurer of the City of St. Louis to deposit funds received pursuant to said sales tax into the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund - Account ONE" appropriating \$9,975,000 from the said sales tax for the period herein stated to the Bi-State Development Agency for certain purposes; providing for the payment of such funds during the period July 1, 2012 through, June 30, 2013; further providing that in no event shall the Comptroller draw warrants on the Treasurer for an amount greater than the amounts of the proceeds deposited in the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund" during the period of July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013; and containing a severability clause.

Board Bill No. 15

An Ordinance pertaining to the Transit Sales Tax imposed pursuant to Section 94.660, RSMo., as adopted and approved by the voters of St. Louis City on November 4, 1997, pursuant to Ordinance 64111 creating the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund" directing the Treasurer of the City of St. Louis to deposit funds received pursuant to said sales tax into the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund - Account TWO" appropriating \$9,975,000 from the said sales tax for the period herein stated to the Bi-State Development Agency for certain purposes; providing for the payment of such funds during the period July 1, 2012 through, June 30, 2013; further providing that in no event shall the Comptroller draw warrants on the Treasurer for an amount greater than the amounts of the proceeds deposited in the "City Public Transit Sales Tax Trust Fund" during the period of July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013; and containing a severability clause.

Board Bill No. 16

An ordinance appropriating the sum of \$19,950,000, as described and defined in Section 94.600 through 94.655, R.S. Mo. 2000 as amended for the period herein stated, which sum is hereby appropriated out of the "Transportation Trust Fund" to the Bi-State Development Agency for transportation purposes; and further providing that the appropriation is conditional upon the Bi-State Development Agency supplying the Board

of Estimate and Apportionment an annual evaluation report; further providing that in no event shall the Comptroller draw warrants on the Treasurer for an amount greater than the amount of proceeds deposited in the "Transportation Trust Fund" during the period from July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013; providing for the appropriation to be reduced if certain funds are used for other than public transit purposes; further providing that the appropriation is conditional upon Bi-State requiring the payment of prevailing wages and benefits to employees of outside service contractors; and containing a severability clause.

Resolution No. 62
Greater Mount Carmel
Missionary Baptist Church
Centennial Celebration

WHEREAS, we have been apprised the Greater Mount Carmel Missionary Baptist Church is celebrating its 100th year anniversary on Sunday, June 10, 2012; and

WHEREAS, the Greater Mount Carmel Baptist Church was organized in January 1912, under the leadership of The Reverend C. Gosby; it was called the Olivette Baptist Church and was located at 2920 Market Street. After several name changes, the church moved from its location to 3222 Laclede Avenue, and then became known as Mount Carmel Baptist Church; and

WHEREAS, on February 2, 1951, the Rev. Earl E. Nance, Sr., an associate minister of the Galilee Baptist Church and a public school teacher, was called as Pastor. With a congregation of 18 and a great deal of faith in God, Reverend Nance accepted the great challenge that he knew was before him; and

WHEREAS, the first thing Pastor Nance did was let the people know that the run down building was not a proper place of worship God. He felt that the house of worship should be just as nice, if not nicer, than any other place that welcomed the public and the children of God. Some told Reverend Nance that it would impossible to build a new church at this time, but Pastor Nance said that nothing is impossible with faith and a lot of hard work. So, undaunted, Reverend Nance became the contractor and the members and friends of the church became the laborers, painters, and bricklayers. After a year and seven months,

the dedication services were held from Sunday, October 26, 1952 to November 9, 1952. The final dedication message was delivered by the uncle of Pastor Nance, the Rev. John E. Nance, then the pastor of the Washington Tabernacle Baptist Church. It was during this service that the name of the church was changed to Greater Mount Carmel Baptist Church; and

WHEREAS, to make way for urban redevelopment, the church was sold in 1956 for almost twice its original cost, and in less than five years. One can see from this single example, that they were blessed to have a minister of Reverend Nance’s caliber to lead them. He not only was a great pulpitier, but a capable administrator as well; and

WHEREAS, for the next two years church services were held in the Baptist Educational Building at 1411 North Grand Boulevard, while their edifice at 1617 North Euclid was being erected. On the first Sunday in January 1960, they marched into their present church. The church’s seating capacity was 750, and had a membership of 725 families. The church thanked God daily for sending such a leader in Pastor Nance, Sr. Early 1994 Pastor Nance, Sr. announced that he would no longer pastor the Great Mount Carmel Baptist Church. He named his son, Reverend Earl E. Nance, Jr. as his successor. Reverend Earl E. Nance, Jr. was installed as the Pastor of Greater Mount Carmel on Sunday, April 24, 1994. Reverend Earl E. Nance, Sr. served as Pastor Emeritus until his death on April 4, 2000; and

WHEREAS, Greater Mount Carmel, under the leadership of their current Pastor Reverend Earl E. Nance, Jr. has undergone major renovations. Today their edifice speaks of royalty, the place of worship for children of the King, with deep purple and white décor. To the Greater Mount Carmel Church Family, its value is priceless. They are still prayerful that God will continue to give Reverend Nance, Jr. his grace and wisdom to lead us to greater spiritual heights.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of St. Louis that we pause in our deliberations to join Mt Carmel in celebrating its 100 years of dedication and serving of the community and its loyal and loving membership to the City of St. Louis and pray that God provides continued leadership who will look back on this celebration of 2012 and we further direct the Clerk of this Board to spread a copy of this Resolution across the minutes of these proceedings and to prepare a commemorative copy to the end that it may be presented to our honorees at a time and place deemed appropriate by the Sponsor.

Resolution No. 64
Grace Hill Patch Project

WHEREAS, the Patch Neighborhood Center is a community-based center that enlists the involvement of residents to improve neighborhood conditions. These residents are the MORE Board, “Member Organized Resource Exchange.” They are the ones that make the decisions for all programs located at the Patch Center, as well as how to improve the community which they live. It serves a neighborhood bounded by Holly Hills, I-55, south city limits and the Mississippi River; and

WHEREAS, the Patch Center originated in 1962 with the support of the National Lead Company of St. Louis, the Great Lakes Carbon Corporation, the Ship Building and Federal Barge, Inc., Eagle Equipment Company, Sunline Company and the Banner Ironworks Company. The George A. Cappa Foundation and the Smith Foundation contributed funds. Representatives from these industries are on the Advisory Board to represent the neighbors and the community in the Patch area. It was said to be the only such center in the area sponsored by industry; and

WHEREAS, Grace Hill Settlement began supervising the Center’s operation in February 1962. A building located at 329 East Courtois Street was opened and a pre-school program was started. At 229 East Marceau a youth program, operated by George Krupp was began, where they taught boxing to youths 14 years and older; and

WHEREAS, the Patch Thrift Shop was started at the 501 East Marceau location to assist with training neighbors to operate the shop and make it self supporting; and

WHEREAS, in 1971 GED classes began at the 329 East Courtois location. And In 1973 the Senior Program started at 7625 South Broadway; and

WHEREAS, on May 11, 1977 Alderman Albert Villa and Edward Renshaw, President, St. Louis Ship, participated in the dedication of the new Patch Neighborhood Center at 7915 Minnesota where it is presently located. The building was extended in 1981, 1984 and in 1997; and

WHEREAS, the Patch Center offers a variety of social and supportive services including ongoing training though the Neighborhood College Courses, the CO-CARE (Care Options for Children at Risk Everyday) program provides parent training

to improve child care and parent skills and STAES, (System to Assure Elderly Services); and

WHEREAS, the Food Pantry was started in 1993 after the flood. Volunteers received special training from Operation Food Search on keeping the Food Pantry up to code. In one year alone, they assisted 1,556 families and 3,561 individuals with a variety of food items; and

WHEREAS, the Grace Hill/Patch Neighborhood Center has been an asset to the Community, Neighbors they serve, Volunteers, and has always followed the motto "Neighbors Helping Neighbors."

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of St. Louis that we pause in our deliberations to recognize and honor the Patch Project and we further direct the Clerk of this Board to spread a copy of this Resolution across the minutes of these proceedings and to prepare a commemorative copy to the end that it may be presented to our honorees at a time and place deemed appropriate by the Sponsor.

LIVING WAGE RATES**

EFFECTIVE APRIL 1, 2012

In accordance with Ordinance No. 65597, the St. Louis Living Wage Ordinance (“Ordinance”) and the Regulations associated therewith, the City Compliance Official for the City of St. Louis has determined that the following living wage rates are now in effect for employees of covered contracts:

- 1) Where health benefits as defined in

the Ordinance are provided to the employee, the living wage rate is **\$11.93** per hour (130% of the federal poverty level income guideline for a family of three); and

- 2) Where health benefits as defined in the Ordinance are **not** provided to the employee, the living wage rate is **\$15.52** per hour (130% of the federal poverty level income guideline for a family of three, plus fringe benefit rates as defined in the Ordinance).
- 3) Wages required under Chapter 6.20 of the Revised Code of the City of St. Louis: **\$3.59** per hour.

These rates are based upon federal poverty level income guidelines as defined in the Ordinance and these rates are effective as of **April 1, 2012**. These rates will be further adjusted periodically when the federal poverty level income guideline is adjusted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services or pursuant to Chapter 6.20 of the Revised Code of the City of St. Louis.
