Board Bill No. 31 (Committee Substitute)

An ordinance submitting to the qualified voters of the city of St. Louis a proposed amendment to the charter of the city of St. Louis restructuring the board of aldermen as a body of twelve (12) aldermen representing twelve (12) wards, providing a transition schedule for such changes, and other related matters; providing for an election to be held for voting on the proposed amendment and for the manner of voting; and for the publication, certification, deposit, and recording of this ordinance; and containing an emergency clause.

Explanation of Vote on Board Bill 31 in Accordance with Rule 47 of the Board of Aldermen

I am voting in favor of Board Bill 31, because I fundamentally believe that our voters have the right to determine how much representation they want. Board Bill 31 enables voters to decide whether they wish to change the Charter to reduce the number of aldermen from 28 to 14. However, although Charter changes require 60% of all voters to vote in the affirmative, even the vote does not allow voters in each ward to make this determination. So, for example, if voters in one ward are extremely upset with their aldermanic representation, they might weight the vote heavily in favor of reducing the Board of Aldermen. And, if voters in one ward are extremely happy with their aldermanic representation, they might weight the vote heavily in opposition to reducing the Board of Aldermen.

The process is being promoted by the sponsors as largely symbolic for the following reasons:

1. there has been no study of the impact of this reduction on representation, service delivery, or operations of the City.

2. minimal savings, if any, are anticipated.

3. there has been no consideration of alternative scenarios such as reducing or increasing the Board of Aldermen gradually, tied to specific population changes over time at redistricting, following a Census.

In 2004 when the Charter Amendments were proposed, including one to reduce the number of aldermen, I noted that there isn't any "magical" number appropriate for the number of aldermen we should have. At that time it was suggested that the values for discussion were greater efficiency, greater effectiveness, increased equity, greater accountability, and greater responsiveness.

Greater Efficiency: The less diversity and fewer people you have in any body, the more likely it is that there will be less discussion and fewer disagreements. This could be viewed as greater efficiency. However, it is also less democratic.

Greater Effectiveness: This is a value judgment, depending on who happens to be the alderman you have and whom you have eliminated from the Board of Aldermen as a result of having fewer aldermen. Fewer members of the Board of Aldermen does not necessarily mean that you will have more qualified members to make decisions and to represent their constituencies. This is also a value judgment depending upon what the Board of Aldermen is expected to do. To exaggerate the point for illustration purposes, the most effective and efficient Board of Aldermen would likely be one consisting of one member, who would make all decisions. However, if we are asking aldermen to "roll up their sleeves" and advocate for service delivery to meet the challenges of their respective wards, then fewer advocates might not mean greater effectiveness.

Increased Equity: I fail to see how fewer members of the Board of Aldermen would increase equitable distribution of resources and services. **In fact, in 2012 I am recognizing this as a social justice issue. If we know: 1) that the number and severity of challenges are increasing in our City, 2) that our City has aging infrastructure that is demanding more and more resources, 3) that we have more service needs with fewer persons to perform services, and 4) we have not made systemic changes to deliver services more efficiently and effectively, then reducing the Board of Aldermen would result in less help being offered to those who are in greater need.**

Greater Accountability: This depends upon to whom one wishes the individual members of the Board of Aldermen to be accountable. It is my belief that the fewer constituents one has, the more accountable he/she is to those constituents and the less likely that outside influences, including lobbyists and money, can work to try to dilute the influence of "real people".

Greater Responsiveness: It is unlikely that fewer aldermen would result in greater responsiveness. Certainly, additional constituency outreach would allow for telephone calls, e-mails, social networks, and other means of communication to occur with constituents. However, the personal touch of speaking one-on-one between elected officials and constituents could be diminished. As we know, the more people through which a message goes, the more likely that message is to be changed by the perspective of the individual passing the message along. And, the more likely that the message will be misinterpreted. Since at least 1876 there have been 28 wards.

I believe we are putting the cart before the horse, because we have not identified:

1. the functions aldermen are currently performing;
2. the amount of time spent on each of these functions and the percentage of time devoted to each function;
3. what functions we want aldermen to be performing and who (or what) should be performing functions if aldermen are no longer going to be performing them; and
4. what amount of aldermanic time is devoted to service delivery versus legislative policy-making, for instance, and how we might increase service delivery efficiency and effectiveness to reduce the amount of aldermanic time devoted to this function.

It seems as though some in the community have seized upon what appear to be mathematical formulas to set a new number of wards. Namely numbers have been bantered about like the high watermark of 800,000 residents in the City of St. Louis that existed in the 1950s. Some have then hypothesized that the mathematical formula would then be that we should cut the membership in the Board of Aldermen in half. While there might be some arguments to consider cutting the Board of Aldermen by 50%, particularly if we achieved efficiencies and effectiveness in government through reform of the service delivery systems, nevertheless the 800,000 number seems to be an irrelevant number. What does seem significant to me are the census figures for 1870 (the last census prior to the Charter of 1876 which preceded the current 1914 Charter). If St. Louisans were calculating representation ratios for legislators in 1876 based on population, then these are the figures they had. Also potentially relevant would be the 1880 census figures for the City of St. Louis, following the schism of the City and County in 1876 and the resulting Charter

of 1876. Also relevant would be the 1910 census figures for the City of St. Louis (the last census prior to the 1914 Charter) and lastly, the census results for the City of St. Louis in 2000 and 2010 would be relevant. Upon reviewing these census figures, and in order to consider the greater context in which these figures existed, I also believe it is informative to note that in 1876, 1880 and 1910, the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution, giving women the right to vote had not yet been passed (the 19th Amendment was adopted on August 26, 1920). And, Amendment 26 to the United States Constitution, giving 18 year old and older the right to vote had not yet passed (the 26th Amendment was adopted on June 30, 1971). Also, according to the 1876 Charter for the newly formed City of St. Louis there were 41 legislators in a bicameral legislature (12 Council members plus 1 president {elected city-wide} all of whom had to be qualified voters; and 28 House of Delegates members elected by each of the 28 wards). In 1914 the Charter for the City of St. Louis eliminated the Council and changed the House of Delegates to the Board of Aldermen with 28 legislators. According to my math, if one divides each of the total population and the eligible voting age population by the number of legislators, one gets the following chart, representing the number of persons that each legislator represented:

Thus, it could reasonably be argued that in terms of representing eligible voters, each legislator in the City of St. Louis now represents more eligible voters than he/she represented at the times when this issue was previously considered at the times that the Charters for the City of St. Louis were written in 1876 and 1914.

Additionally, it would appear that persons who live in surrounding municipalities in St. Louis County have much more representation per person than our voters do in the City of St. Louis. There is an equity concern if those with higher levels of income have greater representation and live in areas with fewer service delivery challenges.

In April 2010 staff for the President of the Board of Aldermen prepared the attached chart, which shows that some elected persons represent as few as 20.25 persons in Country Life Acres and as many as 6238 persons in University City. But, the aldermen of the City of St. Louis each represented almost twice as many persons as did the representatives in University City.
